UCAS stands for Universities and Colleges Admissions Service. It's the centralised service that students use to apply to university. Pretty much everyone who wants to study an undergraduate degree in the UK will have to apply through UCAS.

All About Apprenticeships

With an apprenticeship, you're employed to do a real job while studying for a formal qualification, usually for one day a week either at a college or training centre. By the end of your apprenticeship, you'll hopefully have gained the skills and knowledge needed to either succeed in your chosen career or progress onto the next apprenticeship level.

What you'll learn depends on the role that you're training for. However, apprentices in every role follow an approved study programme, which means you'll gain a nationally-recognised qualification at the end

Apprenticeship Levels

Just like a college course, apprenticeships come in various different levels, see below for further information:

Intermediate

- > Level 2 (Equivalent to 5 GCSEs grades 4-9)
- > Lasts for 12-18 months

Advanced

- > Level 3 (Equivalent to 2 A-levels)
- > Lasts for 18-48 months

Higher & Degree

- > Levels 4,5,6,7 (Equivalent to a Foundation Degree or above)
- Lasts for 24 months+



All about University

Going to university and gaining a Higher Education qualification is a great way to expand your knowledge, enjoy new experiences, gain independence and meet new people. It can increase your earning potential and develop essential skills needed for entry into your chosen career.

The official UCAS deadline for 2021 entry was the 29th January 2021, but you can still make a late application – it is best to check directly with the Universities of your choice for advice.

2021 entry - Top Tips!

What do you need to do to make an application?

- Familiarise yourself with www.ucas.com. Everything you need to know is on here!
- Decide on the degree you want to do and at which Universities - you get 5 choices.
- Check entry requirements carefully. Every university is different in what they ask for. The UCAS Tariff calculator can help you plan.
- Complete a personal statement which is tailored to your chosen course. It's a good idea to get feed back on your personal statement - your first version is unlikely to be what you submit.

Already sent your UCAS application for 2021 entry

You will need to make an application for student finance via Student Finance England.

Once you have received all your offers – you will then need to make your Firm and Insurance choices.

If moving away from home, organise your student accommodation with your firm choice.

You still have options! There are services such as Extra, Clearing and Adjustment which allow you to add new choices. If you have not used your full 5 choices, you can pay the extra fee and apply for more through UCAS track.
